Literacy skills (n=11)

Nearly all respondents frequently read to their children (n=12).

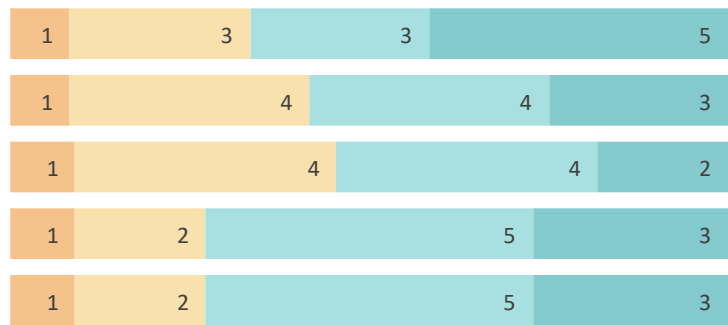
Most respondents often review the alphabet with their children (n=12).

Most respondents often play rhyming games with their children.

Most respondents frequently point out words to their children.

Most respondents frequently talk with their children about math.

Most respondents frequently encourage their children to interact with peers.

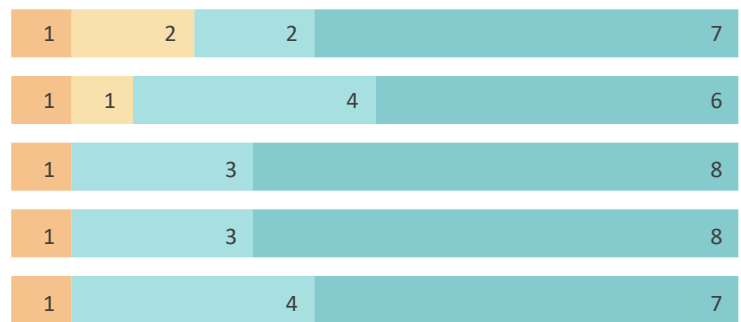
Most respondents frequently model behavior they want their children to show.

Physical activity & motor skills

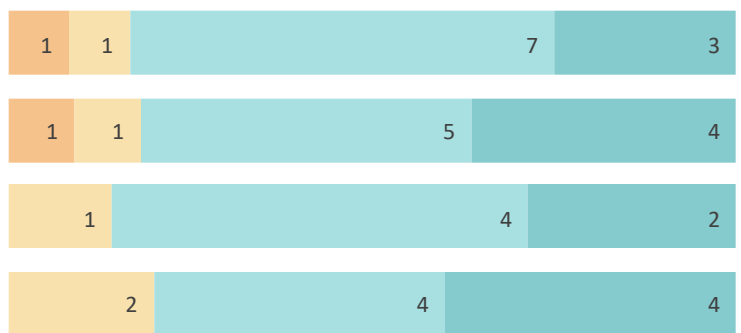
Nearly all respondents regularly encourage their children to draw (n=12).

Legend: Never (orange), 1-2 times per week (yellow), 3-6 times per week (light blue), Everyday (dark blue)



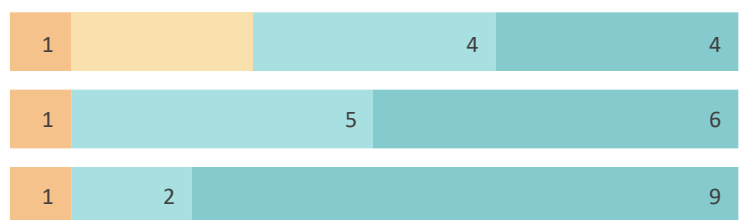
Safe & exciting homes (n=12)

Legend: Never (orange), 1-2 times per week (yellow), 3-6 times per week (light blue), Everyday (dark blue)



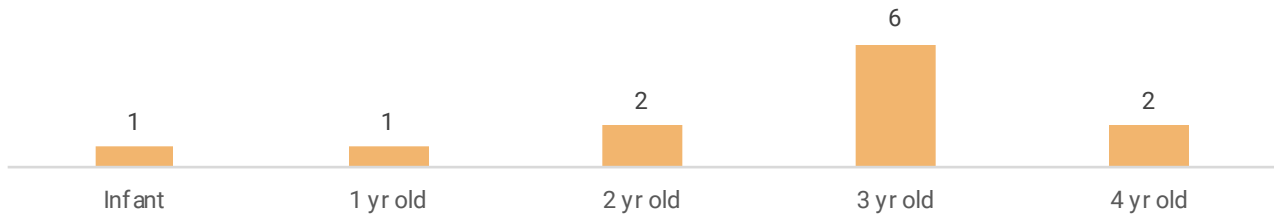
All but one respondent strongly agree that playgroups improve their knowledge of child development milestones.



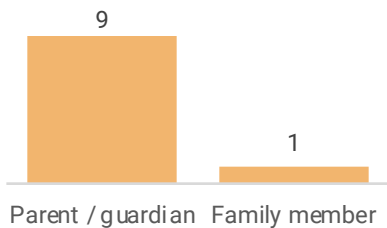
All but one respondent strongly agree that playgroups help them plan activities to do at home with their children.
